Inter-School Swimming Championships

Access to Opportunities

On Thursday morning Ms. Allie's PYP 8 class participated in a gender equality activity as part of their current Unit of Inquiry on 'Access to Opportunities'. The PYP 8 girls hiked from the Codrington campus through a neighbouring cane field to a water source, filling containers before returning to campus. The objective was to replicate, in a very small way, the journey many young girls in impoverished countries are forced to make each day to collect water.

The PYP 8 boys remained in class and completed their regular school work while the girls were walking, highlighting the gender inequality that occurs in education in those countries. While unfair and discriminatory, it was an important hands-on learning experience with a significant life message for our students.



But there was a twist to the activity however. In the interest of equality and fair play, the boys set off on the same journey to collect water in the afternoon while the girls remained in class. The sun was higher and hotter at that stage but the boys rallied together and successfully conquered the challenge.

Both groups embraced the activity with spirit and enthusiasm. Most importantly, they now have a greater perspective of the physical challenges young girls in those countries face each day but also the discrimination they endure by not being allowed to attend school.








Zooming in
